RICH ASSESSMENT TASK 2 RUBRIC (ANALYTICAL ESSAY)

Task

Pick one of the themes that you have explored in *Strange Objects* and write a six-paragraph essay (introduction + four body paragraphs + conclusion) explaining how your understanding of that theme has been influenced by one or more conventions employed by Gary Crew. Each paragraph should clearly explore an aspect of the chosen theme, connecting it to one or more conventions using textual evidence.

Productive mode

Students understand how to use a variety of language features to create different levels of meaning. In creating texts, they demonstrate how manipulating language features and images can create innovative texts. Students create texts that respond to issues, interpreting and integrating ideas from other texts. They edit for effect, selecting vocabulary and grammar that contribute to the precision and persuasiveness of texts and using accurate spelling and punctuation.

Receptive mode

By the end of Year 9, students analyse the ways that text structures can be manipulated for effect. They analyse and explain how images, vocabulary choices and language features distinguish the work of individual authors. Students evaluate and integrate ideas and information from texts to form their own interpretations. They select evidence from the text to analyse and explain how language choices and conventions are used to influence an audience.
