## **Etymology table**

Some of the words in the English language have their origins in other languages like Greek or Latin. Knowing the original meaning of the word, or the significance of the prefix or suffix, can help us to decipher unknown words and find out more about what they mean. The study of the origins of words is called 'etymology'.

For example: 'bicycle' (1868), from *bi*- which means 'two' and a Latinised form of the Greek work *kyklos* which means 'wheel' or 'circle'. 'Bi' comes from the word root *dwo*- which means 'two' (like the Latin word *duo*).
